WELCOME

Welcome

Canterbury Cathedral is the seat of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Canterbury, the Mother Church of the Anglican Communion, and a place of pilgrimage welcoming visitors from across the world.

For over fourteen hundred years God has been worshipped here. With its roots in the Benedictine tradition, the ongoing daily pattern of morning and evening prayer and Eucharist continues the prayers and praises of countless generations in this Cathedral.

Alongside this we host a large number of special services, some regular, some occasional. These mark the feasts of the Church's year and significant events in the life of our local community, or offer opportunities for exploring faith and spirituality in creative and diverse ways.

Whether you are a regular worshipper with us, someone who has come to the Cathedral for a special event, or a visitor making a once in a lifetime journey to Canterbury, you are most welcome and an equal part of this community whose story reaches back to Augustine's mission to England in 597 AD.

WORSHIP

Regular worship

At the heart of Cathedral life is the regular rhythm of daily prayer. The day begins each morning with the quiet, said services of Morning Prayer (Matins) and the 8.00am Eucharist, and ends with the service of Choral Evensong, with music from the Cathedral Choir or one of the many excellent visiting choirs who come to sing during the Cathedral Choir's holidays, or Said Evening Prayer. The Cathedral's principal act of worship every week is the 11.00am Sunday Choral Eucharist.

Live streaming

Choral Eucharists on Sunday, Choral Evensongs, and other special services are routinely live-streamed and available on our website and via YouTube. If you attend these services you may be seen on camera, and by attending these services you give your permission to appear in this way. Julian Silent Prayer Meeting

Visiting Choirs

The Whyte Effect was founded in 2018 and takes its name from the 16th century English composer, Robert Whyte, who worked in both Cambridge and London, like many members of the group. It was formed as a peripatetic group to provide choral music for churches that no longer have a choir, and to deputise at cathedrals.

The Choirs of St. Stephen Presbyterian Church, Fort Worth, Texas led by Jordan Smith and St. John the Evangelist Episcopal Church, Saint Paul, Minnesota led by Richard Gray are joining together to sing the services at Canterbury Cathedral.

The Vasari Singers is one of the UK's top chamber choirs. Regular visitors to Canterbury Cathedral, the choir has a wide and varied repertoire from the Renaissance to contemporary, with a particular focus on commissioning and performing new choral works. Since the group was founded in 1980, they have performed in most UK cathedrals and major concert venues, as well as releasing a number of critically-acclaimed recordings.

Lyra Davidica began in two Warwick schools in the 1980s and now meets once a year to sing the services for a week in a cathedral. It includes singers from across the British Isles (from Scotland, England and from the Isle of Man) as well as some of the original members' children. They are particularly looking forward to singing in the Quire having had to sing all the services with social distancing on the Nave steps in 2021.

Goodnestone Choir was formed in 2013 and has around 26 regular singers from the surrounding area. The choir sings for regular services at Holy Cross Church Goodnestone, as well as occasional concerts and cathedral evensongs.

The choir of **St Paul's, Canterbury** takes a leading role in the weekly Sunday morning worship, as well as the popular monthly Evensong and Supper services, and other seasonal events. The choir has featured as a visiting choir at several cathedrals, primarily around South East England, and at Ypres as part of the daily service held under the Menin Gate.

MUSIC

Epiphonietta is an ad-hoc group of genuinely consort proportions, drawn from The Epiphoni Consort's wider membership of semi-professional singers based in and around London.
