The return of the Archbishop's Crozier

On Monday, Justin Welby laid the crozier of the Archbishop of Canterbury on the altar of the chapel in Lambeth Palace. This symbolic act brought a formal end to his time in office after his resignation at the end of last year. The Crozier is now back in the Cathedral and at the end of the Eucharist today, the Dean will formally receive it and place it beside the empty Chair of St Augustine as we await the appointment of a new Archbishop. We pray at this time for all victims and survivors of abuse within the church; for those who will oversee the Church of England and the Diocese of Canterbury during the vacancy; and for the discernment process to choose a new Archbishop over the coming months.
