Resignation of Archbishop Justin

Archbishop Justin has resigned and will complete his duties on 6 January 2025. Archbishop Justin intends very little public-facing activity between now and Epiphany, but plans to honour a small number of remaining commitments. At Epiphany, the Archbishop of Canterbury's official functions will be delegated to the Archbishop of York. The date on which Archbishop Justin formally ceases to hold office will be set in agreement with the Privy Council.

We continue to recognise the impact of this on everyone not least are we mindful of all those who have been hurt or harmed in any way through abuse or failures in safeguarding. We alongside the diocese have robust measures in place to protect vulnerable adults and children and to support victims of abuse. We have set up a special candle and plaque (given us by a survivor of abuse) in the Chapel of Holy Innocents in the crypt as we pray one for another. Safeguarding is the responsibility of everyone involved in the cathedral in any way. Staff and volunteers are trained and we aim for this place to be safe enough to disclose any information of relevance relating to the care and welfare of everyone here.

Requests for gifts and prizes

In the past it seems that free entrance tickets or other such things have been fairly freely offered when requests have come into the cathedral for raffles, fayres and community events. This has been uncoordinated and often connected with someone knowing someone who could lever that contribution.

The Cathedral is now a regulated charity and can no longer act like this. We can only support others who are closely and directly aligned with our own charitable objects (the advancement of the Christian faith in the Church of England and the care and stewardship of the cathedral) e.g. other Church of England parishes and Church of England schools would be included, general care of the elderly or supporting a PTA would not be eligible. Additionally support could be considered to be offered to organisations that share the cathedral's current strategic commitments as laid out and decided by Chapter. For example, at present this includes homelessness.

So please only make requests if you think it fits these criteria. A number of those offered in the past cannot now be offered because of these new charity rules with which we have to comply. It's the law!
